Eagle Claw Youth Leader Training

These are difficult times for our youth. The pressures of our current culture on our young people are powerful and compelling. It takes a lot of courage to stand up to them and do what is right. For leaders in scouting, it is a tough battle for the hearts and minds of America's youth. Yet, somehow we continue because we believe so strongly in the aims of scouting:

At the core of these is the unit program which is delivered by unit leaders in all of the programs of scouting. To assist the unit leaders in this effort, the Winnebago Council has a program for youth development called "Eagle Claw". For the last ten years, this program has been organized into a high adventure trip to Wyoming's Bighorn Mountains that includes:

- ◆ BSA National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)
- ◆ Leave No Trace Instructor Training
- ◆ Conservation service projects with Bighorn National Forest
- ◆ Development of backpacking and outdoor skills
- ◆ Visit to Mount Rushmore to promote citizenship

Eagle Claw cannot stand alone; it must be integrated with the program of the unit. To that end,



each participant in Eagle Claw must do several things to earn their "claws":

- Serve in a unit leadership position
- Work with the unit leader to teach leadership principles in their home unit
- Perform an act of service in their home unit of their own choosing, for example
 - Teach Leave No Trace
 - Organize a unit outing
 - Teach an outdoor skill

The Commissioner's Corner

10 Best Practices for Unit Commissioners

A commissioner's primary mission is "to help all units succeed." This mission statement is purposefully rather vague, because the needs of each unit we serve are different and unique to their situation. Unit commissioners need to be competent in almost every aspect of Scouting, and be able to adjust our approach to best serve the units. Remember this— being a commissioner has more to do with relationships than anything else. Here is the next installment to present the 10 best practices designed to improve those relationships. These practices were all discussed during the Unit Commissioners' Conference held at Philmont Training Center (PTC).



Best Practice No. 5: Customize the Annual Service Plan

Our mission "to help all units succeed" cannot be fulfilled willy-nilly. We need a plan. If you turn to page 17 of the *Fieldbook*, you will find the annual service plan described using a matrix of tasks and months. The matrix is good, but consider expanding it according to your local units and charter cycle. One great approach is shown in Figure 1 (page 6). This tool lays out specific tasks that unit commissioners should do to fulfill our mission. You may need a unique plan for each unit you provide service for, so don't be surprised if you end up with several of these plans. Once the plan is mapped out, determine the actual dates and transfer them into your calendar.



Try to do this in July, so when you attend each unit's annual planning meeting in August, you can help shape the year by providing the unit leaders your annual schedule. Have you ever tried to set up a last-minute unit assessment meeting in the same month as pinewood derby? The units' programs must come before our commissioners' plans.

Why Go To Wood Badge Course C1-173-11-1?

The purpose of Wood Badge is to develop skilled leaders who can strengthen Scouting units in achieving the mission of the Boy Scouts of America. *The Mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law.*

You go to Wood Badge to improve your leadership of small groups, and your understanding of how teams develop. The heart of Wood Badge is small group leadership. It is great fun too. This training is not only for Scouting. It also helps people at work, in church and other groups, and in families.

Who Is Eligible To Attend Wood Badge?

You may attend Wood Badge if you are registered as an adult in the Boy Scouts of America, trained for your position, and medically able to handle the program. (Scouters who attended an earlier version of Wood Badge are welcome to come again, with the understanding that you will participate fully and work your ticket.)



Here are some more details:

Tenure: You do not have to have been a Scout leader for any minimum number of years.

Trained: If you are eligible to wear a "trained" patch that meets this requirement. That means outdoor skills are required for Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters, and Varsity coaches, but not for others. If you have questions about this, call the course director or council training chair.

Medical: The course includes some walking around the camp and physical activities. The second half of the course involves camping out, but it is in the camp, not hiking into the wilderness. If you are medically unable to do it (or it would be unwise), talk to the course director. ALL participants must turn in the BSA "Medical and Health Record" form, which is available online at: http://www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/34605_Letter.pdf

What is Wood Badge? Wood Badge is advanced leadership training for adult leaders. It teaches skills that are useful in Scouting, at work, in families, and elsewhere. The program is for Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, and Venturing leaders, as well as council and district leaders.

Financial Aid: There is financial aid available, contact the course director. The first 5 persons to sign up receive a \$20.00 discount.



Dates:

Pre-Course Meeting – June 11, 2011 – W.S.R.
 1st Weekend – August 5 through 7, 2011 – W.S.R.
 2nd Weekend – August 19 through 21, 2011 – W.S.R.



What Does It Cost? The fee for the course is \$195. You pay a \$50 deposit when you register. The balance needs to be paid 30 days before your course starts, or earlier. The fee includes all meals during the course, a place to sleep in the camp and all the training, handouts, and course supplies. It does not include the cost of uniforms, items at the Trading Post, etc.

'From the Banks of the Shell Rock'

Greetings from ranger Jeff Koenigsfeld. We are having a great Winter season here at Winnebago Scout Reservation (W.S.R.). Before I came on board there were two huge, very successful, Polar Bear weekends with large numbers of Scouts participating. Since I officially began, we have enjoyed a well attended Klondike Derby. The Snowy Owl campout had over 80 Scouts & leaders. On the weekends that there hasn't been an organized event several troops have taken advantage of our facilities. The new all-season shower house has proven to be very popular. A good time had by all, & a chance for me to meet a lot of helpful new friends. I received many words of support & offers of help which I will be relying on as I undertake my duties in this, my first camping season as ranger. It is coming fast so let's all 'Be Prepared'.



A little about me. I am a native of Marble Rock. My parents still live in the home we moved into when I was a year old. I attended K-12 in our local school district and am seeing many old friends. As a Scouter our troop was led by Arnold Haller, whom my Dad worked for over 40 years at the local lumber yard. Our troop was then taken over by a virtual adolescent who most of you know, Dennis Carney. Some of my fondest memories are of camping at W.S.R., and exploring the south end.

One of the main reasons I accepted this position was the time honored traditions that Scouting in general, and the four previous rangers, have instilled in this beautiful woodland. I will work as hard as I can to maintain the quality experience that you and I have come to expect over the years. I might not do some things exactly as my predecessors, but together we will work toward a smooth transition.

In the few short weeks I have been here I've learned nearly all I need to know about moving snow. COUNCIL & DISTRICT REFUND POLICY

Winnebago Council, Boy Scouts of America

In all programs offered by the Winnebago Council, Boy Scouts of America, a great deal of planning and purchasing takes place well in advance of an event. This includes, but not limited to, staff, food, program materials, patches, awards, rental items, purchase of equipment, and in some cases T – shirts and hats.

When an individual or group makes a reservation for an activity or program, they are included in the ordering of program materials and staffing for the event.

When a reservation is not honored, the costs must be absorbed by those attending and in some instances this prevents others from attending an event.

Individuals or groups that cancel a program reservation 30 days prior to the date of the event will receive an in-house credit of fees paid, less a 15% charge. Request for refunds **MUST** be received in writing in order for credit to be applied.

Scouting units that cancel a program reservation 30 days prior to the date of the event will receive a credit to their unit account of fees paid, minus a 15% charge. Request for refunds **MUST** be received in writing 30 days prior in order for credit to be applied.

No refunds will be made after the 30 day cancellation deadline.

If an emergency occurs, beyond your control, write or call the Council Service Center immediately. All requests will be considered on an individual basis, the 15% administrative charge will still apply.

If the Winnebago Council has to cancel an event, the fee may be transferred to another event, credited to the unit's account, or refunded.

Promote Eagle Projects in your Community

Let your community know the service your Eagle Scouts give to them. Stop in at the Scout Office and pick up one of the two "Eagle Scout Service Project in Progress" signs.

Place the sign alongside the street, road or sidewalk where the Eagle Project is taking place. Everyone driving or walking by will see the great work scouting does in their community.

Signs will be checked out on a first come, first serve basis, and should be returned to the Scout Office promptly. A deposit of \$75.00 is required and will be returned when you bring back the sign undamaged.

Currently, our Council is in possession of two (2) of these signs, both of which were donated. We are in need of more money to be donated so we can purchase more signs. We want the community to see what our future Eagle Scouts are doing to improve the community around us. Please contact the Winnebago Council Office if you would like to donate money for this cause.

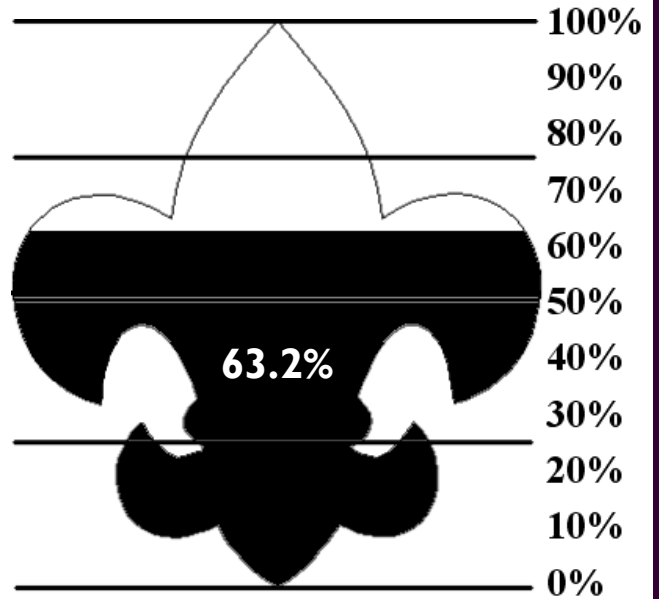

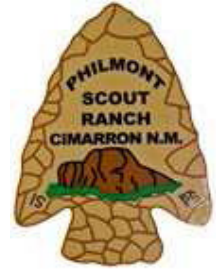
There are lots of exciting things happening with High Adventure activities in the Winnebago Council.

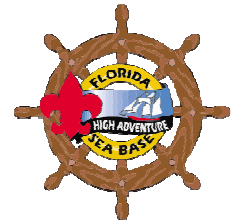

OUTDOOR SKILLS INSTRUCTION (OSI)

Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills
Ingawanis Adventure Base, Waverly, Ia.

May 13th – 15th, 2011

Thank you for your interest in taking Outdoor Skills Instruction (OSI). Your desire to learn outdoor skills, or refresh the skills you already know, speaks for your dedication to the scouting program. Let me take a couple minutes to inform you about what preparation is needed and what to expect during your OSI weekend experience. This course is required for adults who wish to complete all basic training requirements for Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters.

This spring, OSI will be conducted at the Ingawanis Adventure Base in Waverly, Iowa, on May 13th – 15th, 2011. Check-in will be from 6:00 – 7:00 pm, Friday, May 13th, at the Dining Hall. The event will run until approximately noon on Sunday, May 15th. The cost for this course will be \$15 to cover expenses for food and training materials and will be collected at Ingawanis, on Friday evening, during registration.

Participants will be responsible for bringing and preparing your own meals for Saturday breakfast and Sunday breakfast. On Saturday, lunch and supper will be provided for you at camp. Be aware that no meals will be served Friday night, so please eat before you arrive.

Participants will be sleeping indoors at one of the Ingawanis campsites, and you'll need to supply some camping and personal supplies (sleeping bags, personal gear, etc.). Showers will be available. The Camp Quartermaster will also be open if anyone needs additional gear.

Please turn in a completed pre-registration form to the Scout Office by Wednesday, May 11th. This will help the OSI staff estimate how many participants to expect. If you have any questions, or if any special accommodations are needed, please contact me at my email address below.

Check out this inspiring story...

Eagle Scout, Nicholas Frazier (Troop 1338, Ackley) was in an auto accident and he will be the first to tell you that his involvement in Scouting was instrumental in how he handled the accident.

January 2009, Nick was 16 and on his way home from a pickup basketball game. He hit a patch of ice and put his truck in the ditch. The impact of a culvert bent the truck frame and broke the driver side window. Although he was wearing his seat belt, his neck was cut on the broken glass, however he was fortunate not to have any broken bones.

He crawled out of the truck. The cut on his neck started on his chin and extended into his cheek severing a nerve by his lip. He remembered from his first aid training that the cut was severe. He tried to call 911 but the operator was not able to understand his location.

Knowing he needed help he walked to a farm house (some 300 yards away). The elderly farmers were a little surprised to find a young man covered with blood on their doorstep. Nick refused to go sit on their couch (not wanting to track in blood) and also after sharing his name and parent's phone number said, "I think I might be going into shock. Could you get me a blanket and help me put my feet up?" **FIRST AID TRAINING MERIT BADGE AT IT'S BEST !!!**

The night resulted in a helicopter ride to the University of Iowa and a nerve graph the following day. They removed a nerve near his ear and transplanted it to his chin. Nick gave up feeling in his left ear but regained almost full use of his lip.

He was a brave young man throughout the whole process and his Boy Scout training certainly contributed to his cool head and decisive actions.


